Following are focus areas for worship and intercession as we join together to seek God's face as a nation-under-God on the National Day of Prayer

“Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord.

The people He has chosen for His own inheritance.” **Psalms 33:12**

- ◆ Prepare your heart to worship the Father in spirit and in truth.
 - * “But an hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth; for such people the Father seeks to be His worshipers.” **[John 4:23](#)**

- ◆ Ask for God's redemption in bringing men and women locally and around the world from darkness to Light; from death to Life.
 - * “But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for God's own possession, so that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who has called you out of darkness into His marvelous light.” **[1 Peter 2:9](#)**
 - * “We know that we have passed out of death into life, because we love the brethren. He who does not love abides in death.” **[1 John 3:14](#)**

- ◆ Ask the Father, through daily, consistent, Spirit-breathed intercessions, for a new outpouring of His Holy Spirit on our nation; raising up of a new generation of Christian leaders at every level of government.
 - * “First of all, then, I urge that entreaties and prayers, petitions and thanksgivings, be made on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity.”

- ◆ Ask for peace and quiet confidence for the people of God, in uncertain times, that we might be light in our own generation.
 - * “And the work of righteousness will be peace, And the service of righteousness, quietness and confidence forever.”
[Isaiah 32:17](#)
 - * “So that you will prove yourselves to be blameless and innocent, children of God above reproach in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, among whom you appear as lights in the world.” **[Philippians 2:15](#)**

- ◆ Ask the Lord for godly men and women who, on both a local and global scale, will serve God's purposes among the nations: men and women who fight social injustice; provide food and water to the hungry and thirsty; give godly, wise and courageous leadership in war; seek to end human traffick-ing; and communicate in all cultures to this generation that Jesus Christ alone is Lord.
 - * And He was saying to them, “The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore beseech the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest.” **[Luke 10:2](#)**



From the Pastor's Pen

I write at the end of a memorable week – three funerals in six days. All three persons loved Jesus and served Him with their lives. All three are with Him today in paradise. Our church family has had cause for celebration mixed with great grief – a picture of life.

Harold Burgess was driving less than a month before he died. His cancer was a surprise – it hit hard and fast, although the progression of the disease mercifully gave him time to speak words of love, comfort and

assurance to family and friends. Marcia, his wife, and the family cared for him lovingly and ably, holding his hand all the way as he crossed the Jordan into glory.

Mildred Campbell went to lunch on March 23rd, as she would have any other day. Yet, as she arose from the table on that day, in the blink of an eye, she passed into the arms of Christ. Ninety years of “normal” life and then whisked away, almost like Elijah in his chariot of fire.

Paul Eggum was full of life and health for most of his years, but then began to suffer, it seemed, one physical challenge after another. His last years on earth were plagued with difficulties – aneurism, stroke, rheumatoid arthritis among them. It was only after a long and great battle the Lord took Him home.

Three different lives passing from this earth in three different ways.

As I thought and prayed over these things early one morning, the Lord brought to mind the passage in the last chapter of John's gospel, where Jesus charged Peter with feeding His sheep. It's there He speaks of the kind of death by which Peter would glorify God – a death of dependency upon others.

In hearing this, Peter then expressed concern about John, who was, apparently, following them as they walked and talked together. Jesus basically replied, “What happens to him is not your primary concern, Peter. You just concern yourself with following Me.”

A good word for us all.

We live in a culture of comparison and competition. Even in death, we're tempted to wonder why one person lives 90 years and another is taken at 65, or why one person dies suddenly and others suffer and linger for months and even years.

We can waste a lot of time and energy dwelling on these things. Better to receive the words of Christ to Peter – that God is sovereign over life and death and our task is not to worry about our own death or the death of others. Our task is simply to follow Him. If we're found following Him moment by moment throughout life, then He will be glorified in our death, no matter how or when it comes.

Not a one of us knows what tomorrow holds for us.

Even as I thought and prayed over what I would share at these funerals, before the first one commenced, the thought hit me – I could die before any of them are conducted. If that would glorify God, that I should die at 41, then so be it. Would that be fair? Would that be merciful? By the world's standards, no, but in God's economy, yes, and that must be enough for us.

We will miss these fine brothers and sister. They added to our fellowship and to Christ's Kingdom, and made our world a better place. We dare not wish them back with us, however. They have realized the goal of their faith. They have run the race and are now enjoying the prize. The Lord gives and the Lord takes away in His way and in His time. Each of them have glorified Him on earth by completing the work given them to do. Praise the name of the Lord!

Jon and Amanda Reifsnyder's connection with WFMC began fifteen years ago when they attended youth group during high school days at West Jessamine. Amanda started in 1995 and influenced Jon to come, though their parents attended other churches.

Jon grew up in Nicholasville, and Amanda's family lived in Wilmore while her dad was in seminary. Jon and Amanda were married here on November 26, 2005, and have three sons, Liam (3), Aidan (1 ½), and Tobias (due in June). They live in Nicholasville and choose to make WFMC their church home because of the "high integrity and commitment to holiness" they find here. They became members last fall.

Jon attended UK and Amanda attended Campbellsville University, later transferring to UK. Jon worked in management with a company in Lexington for seven years and now works at First Southern National Bank in Nicholasville and Wilmore. He also runs a photography business out of their home. Amanda taught fourth and fifth grades in elementary school before their children were born, and now works part time as a church secretary in Nicholasville.

Jon and Amanda are awed at how God has guided and ordered their lives. Amanda gave her life to Jesus at a church camp when she was seven or eight, and Jon came to personal faith at age eleven or twelve. They are deeply committed to walking with God and bringing up their children to know and love Jesus. They feel "so blessed to be a part of this congregation," and want to develop close relationships with other believers here.

The Reifsnyderys team-teach fourth grade Christian Life Club on Wednesday nights. Amanda serves in the church nursery and attends Mom-2-Mom whenever possible. Jon serves on the parking crew, mows grass, shovels snow, and plays on the softball team.

The Reifsnyderys enjoy taking their boys to community arts-related events and activities. They also cherish quiet times at home, talking, planning and daydreaming, and an occasional night out for dinner with the boys in the care of grandparents.

Jeremiah and Megan Snapp were looking for a child-friendly church close to home, a church where they could know people and be known and "not be lost in the crowd." Their search ended last August when they found WFMC. Their son Nathan was a year old.

Jeremiah grew up in Rhode Island and Megan in Louisville, KY. They met in the summer of 2000 when both worked at Altamons, a United Methodist camp in Virginia. After a two-year long-distance relationship, they were married in August 2002, at the church in Bowling Green, KY, where Megan interned under the youth minister's direction.

Growing up in a Christian family, Megan acquired a strong faith early on and made a personal commitment to the Lord at age thirteen. After graduating from Western Kentucky University she earned an M.Div. from Gordon-Conwell Seminary in Massachusetts and worked for two years as an academic advisor at Asbury Theological Seminary. Now she focuses on teaching and caring for Nathan. At church she leads a discussion group for the Tuesday night Beth Moore Bible study led by Pam Pepper.

Jeremiah graduated from Virginia Tech, with a four-year break midway through to serve in the U.S. Navy. During one of his summers at Altamons he encountered the gospel and became a Christ-follower through the influence of staff members who were "very intentional about their faith." In retrospect he wishes he had come to know the Lord earlier. He works as a network administrator at Asbury Seminary, and hopes at some point to work more directly with people rather than machines.

The Snapps live in Wilmore and are "really happy with the church," says Jeremiah. They are open to God's leading regarding long-term plans. "We are trying to figure out what our next steps should be."

For recreation and fun, they like to do "simple things, mostly outdoors," things like taking Nathan to watch the trains pass through downtown Wilmore, or watching the cows at the dairy farm adjacent to their home.

Getting to Know You

Foundation, Faith, Future

I have never enjoyed running. Almost immediately my muscles get tense, and my neck and shoulders become tight. After a few minutes, my breathing becomes labored, my chest begins to burn, and my throat feels like it's closing. If I stick it out, I start to hear a mantra in time with my steps: "stop, stop!, stop!!", and I usually do stop, gasping for air and wishing that I liked to run.

In II Timothy 4, the apostle Paul victoriously claims that he has "fought the good fight" and "finished the race." Obviously, Paul was not attempting to complete a 5K race, nor do I have any idea if he enjoyed a nice morning jog or not. But he did have a goal in sight, a spiritual goal, and he knew that getting there would take hard work and determination.

Our church, too, is working towards a goal. Since September 2008, we have been steadily accumulating funds to construct a new building. This facility will give our ministries the elbow room they need to function at their best. With an ever-growing congregation (Praise the Lord!), the need for extra space is acute in many areas.

As we run our Foundation, Faith, Future race, let's keep our focus on the prize and faithfully push ahead. And this prize is not a building, by the way, but the joy of obedience to the Lord's purpose for our church. Though running our race may be difficult at times, there are a few running tricks I've picked up that might help us to stay the course.

1. Count your steps

When I don't want to run anymore and my mind is telling me stop, one trick I use is to count my steps. It helps me focus on something other than the pain of running and gives me a sense of accomplishment. Similarly, the FFF team has mounted a screen in the

foyer that updates weekly to show our financial progress. Check it out next Sunday as you enter or leave service; it will be an encouragement to you!

2. Pick a short-term goal

Another trick I have discovered is to pick a short-term goal to run towards, usually an object about 150 feet in front of me. Once obtained, I pick a new goal and keep on going. Somehow, I am more likely to keep running if I break the long distance into several shorter pieces. Likewise, several million dollars sounds like a lot and can be discouraging. Instead, the FFF team celebrates milestones as each \$500,000 is accumulated. Won't you keep running as we look towards our next goal?

3. Listen to Relaxing Music

Finally, I have found that my whole run goes better if I listen to soothing music rather than aggressive, fast music. My muscles relax and my attitude towards running becomes less anxious. If you find yourself anxious about the progress we are making on the FFF campaign, I would encourage you to seek peace as well. Pray about our campaign and seek out God's perspective about our race and where WFMC is headed.

So, keep running. Keep giving towards the FFF campaign and help us cross the finish line. I know that many in our congregation are making financial sacrifices to support FFF which are difficult to sustain. But let's not give in to the comfortable, tempting thoughts of stopping. Instead, let's trust in the God who owns the cattle on a thousand hills and Who has blessed the ministries of our church so much that we need more room! He has blessed us thus far, and He will keep doing so if we will keep our feet moving.

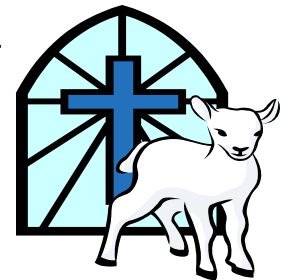

The Mentor Leader: Secrets To Building People and Teams That Win Consistently ~ by Tony Dungy

Hey, Mom...dad...businessman or woman...teacher...pastor...you-name-it! Those who have big-people, little-people following them, in need of becoming a winning part of something much greater than themselves ---a family, a company, a school, a church... etc. Those who want to become "winners" themselves.

This is a beautiful MUST-READ! [Even if you don't like football, or any sport for that matter. Please don't let that make you pass-by this read!] The author is a Christian who happens to have been a coach! The Lord has given him, through his experiences in football, both as player and coach, (as well as being a husband and father) tremendous insights to help you enter into the world of mentoring leaders and creating winning "teams."

Okay. You say you don't have the time to spare to read another book? Then don't. Let me make a suggestion:

- Read only the last chapter entitled Q & A with Tony Dungy (pages 205-227).

There are also other brief sections in the book that make "turning a few pages" worth its weight in gold!

- Try chapter 6, entitled The Model of a Mentor Leader: Living The Message [sixteen pages]
- Or, chapter 7, where Dungy speaks of how to maximize (your) team performance (twenty-six pages).
- One more for you. Dungy's list of Action Steps at the end of each chapter (nine chapters, nine Action Steps lists).

A word of caution: Anyone of the above may "gang-tackle" you into reading the rest of the 200-plus pages!
